# Recycling

All licensed garbage collectors in Guilford County are required to provide recycling collection as part of their service. Each company has their own list of acceptable materials, check with your collector about your specific program.

If you don't subscribe to a curbside collection service, there are numerous recycling dropoff centers in High Point and Greensboro. See their information later in this guide.

## Tires, Electronics, Appliances

Tires, appliances and electronics are not accepted at the landfill. You can bring these, free of charge, to Bishop Road for recycling. You can bring five tires free each fiscal year (July 1<sup>st</sup> – July 30<sup>th</sup>). After that there is a minimal charge per tire. Our friendly staff will unload the items for you.

#### Yard Waste

Grass clippings, hedge trimmings, tree limbs and leaves are all considered yard waste. Most yard waste can be composted. For information about composting, please contact the Guilford County Cooperative Extension at (336) 641-2400. Most of the County's licensed haulers provide curbside collection service for yard waste for an additional fee. Contact your hauler directly for more information.

Put your Christmas tree to good use after the holidays by taking advantage of the County's recycling program that turns live Christmas trees into mulch and compost for County parks. Remove all lights, decorations, stands and covers, then drop your tree(s) off between December 26th and January 15th. Wreaths, garlands, and artificial trees are not accepted.

# Illegal Dumping and Illegal Burning

Illegally disposing of waste can cause serious health and safety risks for both people and the environment. Additionally, it is against the law to burn anything in Guilford County other than natural vegetation, including things like lumber and pallets. # **GUILFORD COUNTY**

## Land Clearing and Inert Debris (LCID)

LCID materials are limited to concrete, brick, concrete block, uncontaminated soil, rock, gravel, limbs, leaves and stumps. LCID landfills do not accept lumber of any kind or materials that have been painted or coated with sealants or finishes. #### Construction Debris

Unwanted materials that result from the construction or demolition of buildings and other structures are termed construction and demolition (C&D) waste. These materials can be disposed of in the same manner as municipal solid waste, or regular household trash. However, it is less expensive and more environmentally friendly to dispose of them at a C&D facility where they may be recycled. There are currently four C&D facilities available to residents in Guilford County. Please contact each facility directly for hours of operation, costs and other pertinent information.

# HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE

## Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Program

The HHW Collection Program is open to all residents of Guilford County and provides safe and environmentally secure disposal of hazardous materials. You may drop off materials at the site free of charge. Commercial waste is not accepted. The HHW Center is located at Ecoflo, Inc., 2750 Patterson Street. Hours: M – F: 10am – 6pm, Saturday: 8am – 2pm.

You may bring the following items to the HHW Center:

## Garage & Workshop

- Acids/bases (i.e. acetone, parts cleaners, and turpentine)
- Auto fluids: antifreeze, motor oil, transmission, starter & break fluids
- · Car and other wet cell batteries
- Contact cement, driveway sealer, fiberglass epoxy

- · Gasoline and other fuels
- Glue (solvent-based)
- Lighter fluid, paint, paint thinner, paint stripper
- Photographic chemicals
- Shellac, stain, varnishes, deck sealers, wood preservatives

#### Home & Garden

- All types of batteries
- Fluorescent bulbs
- Solvent based polish
- Fungicide
- Weed killer

- Mercury thermometers & thermostats
- · Pesticides, insect spray, rat poison
- Pool chemicals
- · Barbeque propane tanks

#### Kitchen & Bath

- Cleaners (solvent based)
- Drain cleaners
- Floor care products

- Hair remover

# Prohibited Items: Do not bring the following items to the HHW Center

- Explosives/shock-sensitive materials
- Garbage
- Medical Waste
- Radioactive Materials

- Reactive and/or unstable materials
- Recyclables
- · Commercial hazardous waste
- Unknown/unlabeled materials

# RECYCLING CONTAMINATION

Help reduce contamination in our recycling stream! Improper recycling leads to increased charges and reduces the amount of items being recycled at the Material Recovery Facility (MRF). This leads to more items going directly to the landfill. Your hard work will go to waste if the recycling is contaminated. Recycling right is good for both the environment and the economy!

- Keep recyclables loose and free. Bagging recyclables means they will never see the light of day. They will be sorted as waste and go directly to the landfill.
- Plastic bags, films and flexible packaging tangle up the recycling equipment. Take clean, dry plastic bags, film (plastic covering over newly purchased items) and flexible packaging (bubble wrap, air pillows, etc.) back to your local grocery store. Only plastic bags containing shredded paper are allowed.
- Donate gently used clothing or textiles to a local charity or organization. Check with your local recycling office for donation or alternative textile recycling options.
- Food waste contaminates items in the recycling bin. Wipe or scrape out food containers and empty all bottle/cans of liquids before placing them in the recycling bin. Food scraps should be composted or put in the trash
- Cookware, hangers and wires (mixed metals) do not belong in your curbside recycling. Some local governments recycle scrap metals separately. Ask your local recycling office about proper recycling of scrap metals.
- Always properly dispose of medical waste NEVER in your recycling. Medical waste, especially sharps, poses a threat to the health and safety of the people collecting and sorting the recyclables.
- "Tanglers," such as holiday lights, hoses and cords, not only
  contaminate the recycling stream, they also damage expensive
  equipment and cause safety hazards for the processing center
  employees. Check with your local recycling office to see if they recycle
  these items separately.

# **RECYCLING FACTS**

- Without exception, recycling is the top action society can do to improve the economy, the environment, promote sustainable manufacturing, and prevent waste from going into the oceans.
- In the U.S. recycling levels are currently about 22%, according to a recent EPA funded Yale University Study.
- When recycling levels in the U.S. reach 75% it will be the environmental and CO2 equivalent of removing 55 million cars from the roadways each year.
- When recycling reaches 75% it will generate 1.5 million new jobs in the U.S.
- Manufacturers truly want materials to come back so that they can be reused in their products, but this is not possible if people don't recycle right.
- Recycling is currently a \$200 billion industry in the U.S.
- Recycling generates 7-10 more jobs than landfills and waste to energy plants.
  - Recycling conserves finite natural resources, which is critical as our population continues to grow exponentially.
  - Recycling conserves fresh water up to 95% in the mining and manufacturing process for many materials.
  - ✓ Recycling prevents waste from going into the oceans it is proven that when there is a strong recycling culture, less litter and waste end up in the ocean.
  - ✓ Recycling protects forests which help reduce CO2 emissions.
  - Recycling significantly reduces the use of energy from fossil fuels.

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
