In partnership with the community we serve, the Guilford County Department of Public Health shall protect, promote and enhance the health and well-being of the people and the environment of our county.

A Message from the Health Director

Over this past year, our department excelled in several areas and programs in order to promote or enhance our residents' health. Here are just a few examples:

As a part of Public Health 3.0, we began a restructuring of the department in order to allow for expanded partnerships throughout our community. Knowing that social determinants are the major factors that contribute to a person's current state of health, we expanded our influence regarding biological, socioeconomic, psychosocial, behavioral, and social issues that determine one's health status.

We did this by consulting with the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) through research related to biology and genetics; by addressing individual behaviors along with our partners in behavioral health; by developing projects related to substance abuse prevention and injection drug use; and we addressed accidents as a public health issue along with housing and violence.

We are addressing access to health services by partnering with local nonprofit and private clinics, and by offering clinical services at our own locations in High Point and in Greensboro.

We advanced our use of technology by changing from paper Women, Infants and Children (WIC) vouchers to an electronic benefit transfer system (eWIC) for more safe and convenient client use.

We are one of nine sites across the US who began receiving funds from the CDC to develop new approaches for the detection and treatment of antibiotic resistant gonorrhea (a major challenging public health issue nationwide).

We have been so successful in our Greensboro JustTEENS clinic that we expanded and opened a JustTEENS Clinic at our High Point site.

We continue to be the only county health department in the state to monitor the clean-up of petroleum and other hazardous chemical spills.

We continue successful HIV/Sexually Transmitted Infection (STI) testing with our local Community Based Organizations.

We have partnered with other local agencies (as well as other County departments) to address the growing opioid abuse issue in our county by serving on task forces, workgroups and supplying much needed data to aid in county-wide prevention and treatment efforts.

Public Health is on the preventive end of medicine, and we have made a major commitment to developing plans and strategies for reducing and preventing future health issues for Guilford County residents.

Thank you for trusting us with the public's health. Our vision remains to ensure that our residents are: "Healthy people living in a healthy community." We welcome your interest and input in our ongoing efforts to protect our residents and promote good health for all.






Where the money comes from...Revenue



Accomplishments

Allied Health

The WIC Program moved from a paper-based method of WIC benefit issuance to an electronic benefit transfer system (eWIC) in March, 2018. Instead of paper food instruments, WIC food benefits are issued into an electronic benefit account. Families use their eWIC card and PIN to access their food benefits at the grocery store.



Guilford County is one of nine sites across the US who are receiving funding from CDC to participate in an initiative to build local capacity to detect and develop new approaches to investigate and treat antibiotic resistant gonorrhea. Guilford County has partnered with area emergency departments and universities in this effort.

The Public Health Dental clinic partnered with two local Orthodontists, James D. Kaley, DDS and Bruce D. Burns, DDS, in 2008 to provide orthodontic services for underinsured or noninsured children. In FY 2017/2018, more than 40 children benefited from this program.

Clinical Services

In 2018, Clinical Services in Greensboro and High Point have provided several new initiatives, along with the regular public health clinic services. CenteringPregnancy® group prenatal care continues to show exceptional birth outcomes. There have been 52 prenatal groups in Greensboro and 17 prenatal groups in High Point since 2013. Guilford County Public Health has hosted two National Centering Healthcare Institute facilitator trainings for CenteringPregnancy® facilitators attending from all over the United States. The Office of Rural Health has funded efforts to reach more uninsured pregnant women during the first trimester.



The JustTEENS initiative started in 2015 to reduce teen pregnancy rates has been so successful in Greensboro, that this initiative expanded to High Point in 2017. The number of unduplicated teens 15-19 seen in the JustTEENS Clinic has increased by 198% since its inception, providing teen-friendly services with dedicated providers. In fall of 2017, the JustTEENS initiative received \$8,000.00 when named the Glaxo Smith Kline Child Health Recognition Award in the Local Health Department Recognition category.





Community Health Services



The staff in the Community Health Services division were busy during the 2017-2018 fiscal year. Our Universal Newborn Home Visiting Program (Guilford Connects) nurses provided 4,580 home visits. School Health nurses made health related contacts with students 145,584 times during the

school year. Child Care Health consultants provided services to 371 licensed child care centers and homes ensuring that health and safety practices were met for 12,094 pre-school children. Nurses and Social Workers provided monthly case management services to high-risk pregnant women (840), and children (800). Additionally, the Community Alternative Program (CAP) for Disabled Adults and Children prevented 309 clients from entering a Nursing Home Facility or Institution and 47 remain safely in their homes with their care givers.

Environmental Health



The Environmental Health Section is responsible for over 6000 annual inspections for food establishments, lodging establishments, child care facilities, schools, nursing homes, hospitals, jails, swimming pools, tattoo parlors, and the prevention of lead poisoning in children and pregnant

women. In addition to these inspections we also monitor and inspect the installation of all wells and septic systems installed throughout the County to protect public health. Guilford is the only local County Environmental Health Department in the state monitoring the clean-up of petroleum and other hazardous chemical spills to further protect our drinking water and the environment.



Health Education

Community-based HIV/STI testing falls under the umbrella of the Integrated Targeted Testing Services (ITTS) project housed at Public Health which offers HIV, syphilis, Hepatitis C, chlamydia and gonorrhea testing in a variety of nontraditional settings. The Public Health Department's HIV/STI Health Education testing program and community-based partners (Piedmont Health Services and Sickle Cell Agency, NIA Community Action Center, and Triad Health Project) all work together on the ITTS team. Prevention activities are implemented through increasing sexual health awareness, conducting prevention education, and encouraging

HIV/STI testing among high-risk populations through fixed site testing during (nontraditional office hours), special screening events in high-risk communities, prevention awareness to clients on social media, and special events at local colleges/universities.

For the 2017-2018 fiscal year, 605 middle and high school age girls completed Smart Girls Life Skills Training, our Division of Public Health's very own teen pregnancy prevention program. The Smart Girls Team also provided coed sexuality education programming to 703 high school students, addressing teen pregnancy, sexually transmitted

infections and healthy relationships. The team trained 11 health professionals to implement the Smart Girls Life Skills Training curriculum in their respective communities - Mecklenburg, Buncombe, Orange and Forsyth counties.

During the summer of 2017, two of the original Minority Diabetes
Prevention Project (MDPP) classes at Mount Zion Baptist Church (MTZBC)
continued with monthly classes. Enrolled in those classes were 31
participants. In August 2017, one class of eight participants started in the
Cottage Grove community, and in October 2018, another class with eight
participants was started at MTZBC. In January 2018, one MDPP class with
eight participants was started with Guilford Child Development. In February
2018, the two original MDPP classes at MTZBC came to an end. Between

June 2017 — June 2018, five A1c screenings were conducted (three prescreenings, two post-screenings, and one DHHS Employee Engagement event pre-screening). Health Education staff provides continuing technical assistance to ongoing classes and is currently planning for the start of two new classes in the fall of 2018.



Health Education staff have been actively involved with the following coalitions: Greater High Point Food Alliance and its food education and urban ag teams, Greensboro Food Task Force, Guilford County Food Council, and CURE Triad. As part of this, Health Education staff has provided media advertising through several outlets for the grand opening of the High Point Farmer's Market on 4/28/18, and provided both poster billboards and digital ads for a local opioid awareness campaign in April and May 2018.

Employee Engagement Committee



The Employee Engagement Committee was started in February of 2017 due to a suggestion from a staff member stating Public Health (PH) needed a tool to increase employee morale and engagement.
